## Ethnic Studies (ETHN) 1500 Introduction to Ethnic Studies (3 Units) CSU

# **Hours and Unit Calculations:**

48 hours lecture. 96 Outside of Class Hours. (144 Total Student Learning Hours) 3 Units

Catalog Description: This course provides a multidisciplinary introduction and analysis of ethnic groups in the United States. Various theories and perspectives will be examined to better comprehend the effects of institutional racism, marginalization, socio-economic and political discrimination, and ethnocentrism on American ethnic and racial groups.

#### Additional Instructional Materials:

By the end of the course, a successful student will be able to:

- 1. Define and assess the concepts of race and racism, racialization, ethnicity, equity, ethno-centrism, white supremacy, self-determination, liberation, decolonization, sovereignty, imperialism, settler colonialism and anti-racism as analyzed in any one or more of the following: Native American Students, African American Studies, and Latina/o Studies.
- 2. Apply theory and knowledge produced by Native American, African American, Asian American, and/or Latina/o American community to describe the critical events, histories, cultures, intellectual traditions, contributions, lived-experiences and social struggles of those groups with a particular emphasis on agency and group-affirmation.
- 3. Compare and contrast the major demographic patterns of immigrant groups who entered the United States.
- 4. Examine the concepts of religion and gender identity and compare and contrast these ideas influence racism within various American ethnic groups.
- 5. Outline and discuss the major historical and political developments that have influenced and affected specific ethnic communities within the United States.
- 6. Assess how attitudes and behaviors of mainstream society are affected by social factors such as



ethnicity, religion, and cultural differences.

- 7. Critically review how struggle, resistance, racial and social justice, solidarity, and liberation, as experienced and enacted by Native Americans, African Americans, Asian Americans, and/or Latino/a American are relevant to current and structural issues such as communal, national, international, and transnational policies as, for example, in immigration, reparations, settler-colonization, multiculturalism, and language policies.
- 8. Evaluate factors which may influence assimilation of ethnic minorities into the mainstream culture.
- 9. Evaluate the changing role of government policy with regards to the determination of immigrant status in the United States.
- 10. Compare and contrast the experiences of European, Asian, African and Latin American immigrants in the United States in relation to stratification and assimilation.
